SUBJECT: July 25 Meeting Topics: Aug. 25 Community Fair, Community Health and Public Safety-Part 2, and Connected Community

ACTIONS

1. Plan for the Aug. 25 Community Fair.
2. Review the draft policy questions for the Community Health and Public Safety (CH&PS) -Part 2 Action Area. The CAC's feedback will be used to develop outreach questions for the Aug. 25 Community Fair and to draft revised goals and policies. This area includes:
 - Police and Fire Protection;
 - Administrative and Government Services & Communications;
 - Storm Water Management and Water Resources Quality;
 - Water Treatment and Delivery; and
 - Wastewater Collection and Treatment.
3. Continue the July 11 review of draft Connected Community goals and policies. The Planning Commission will hold a work session on the recommended revisions at its Aug. 13 meeting.

DISCUSSION

1. Aug. 25 Community Fair

The Fair is on August 25, 2012 from 8:30-1:30 at Lower Millennium Park (below the Farmer's Market, across the railroad tracks where there is a walk through water fountain). There will be approximately 10 booths as the Fair and one general comp plan booth at the Farmer's Market directing people to the Fair.

Each of the organizations are bringing materials to share and discuss with the community. We would like to have several CAC members there to staff the comp plan, Healthy Ecosystems, and CHPS booths with City staff. You can volunteer to be there for the entire event or work a shorter shift.

47th Street Farms is donating a five boxes of fresh veggies from Luscher Farm as an incentive for people to complete the online survey which will be online August 25.

2. Community Health and Public Safety – Part 2

The 2035 Community Vision statement for CH&PS is as follows:

“Our community is a safe place to live and supports lifelong active and healthy living. We have excellent public safety response systems that work together with an involved community to ensure peace and safety. There are opportunities for active lifestyles and to obtain locally grown food that promotes the health and social interaction of our residents.”

Community Health and Public Safety is divided into two parts: Healthy, Safe People (reviewed at the June 2012 meeting) and Public Facilities and Services. Some of the topics within Public Facilities and Services are included in the City’s Public Facility Plan, last updated in 1997. Statewide Planning Goal 11 requires that cities with more than 2,500 people develop and adopt a public facility plan for areas within an urban growth boundary. The PFP is a support document to the Comprehensive Plan; it addresses the sewer, water and transportation facilities needed to support the land uses designated by the Comprehensive Plan. As part of periodic review and the current Comprehensive Plan Update, the City will revise the existing PFP to be consistent with recent master planning and other efforts.

We’ve again provided Table 1 below to help you track the new CH&PS chapter structure, including existing and new Comp Plan goals.

The community and land use scenario, endorsed in 2011, focuses on preserving existing neighborhoods and creating additional housing and local economic opportunities in locations well-served by infrastructure and services (Town Centers and Neighborhood Villages). Earlier Action Areas examined the City’s housing and job capacity by location and type, through technical analysis of existing conditions and the community’s comments.

Building upon this information, the CH&PS Part 2 Action Area will include Goal 11 goals and policies that address

- how the City can and will serve existing and future residents and businesses of Lake Oswego;
- ensuring the availability of proper infrastructure to serve these identified areas and maintain services Citywide; and
- coordination of future City investments and policy choices to maintain and advance Lake Oswego’s quality of life.

CAC ROLE

Due to the number of topics, we are taking a different approach to this meeting. This meeting will focus on the key issues and preliminary Policy Questions for Discussion in each area (Attachment 1). Keeping recent changes, planning efforts and the regulatory context in mind, please provide your thoughts and comments on the following:

3. Connected Community Goals and Policies

The CAC reviewed the four out of seven goals and corresponding polices with the Transportation Advisory Board at their meeting July 11, 2012. The TAB has been invited to attend this CAC meeting to continue reviewing the remaining goals and policies.

NEXT STEPS

Staff will work with each department to get comments on the draft background reports. The Planning Commission and CAC also will review these questions. The Action Area Fair (formerly referred to as a Summit) will take place on August 25, concurrent with the CH&PS community survey, and will include all CH&PS topics.

The CAC will review the Connected Community goals and policies in August after the Planning Commission work session on August 13.
