~~12. Require water providers and property owners outside the City to pay a systems development charge and a reimbursement fee prior to connecting to the City system.~~

11. Promote efficiency and longevity of the municipal water system by including sustainability* principles in its planning, design, construction and operation.

11. With annexation, require properties to connect to a municipal water supply when it is physically and legally available, and disclose information and encourage abandonment of any existing domestic wells according to State standards.

Comment [S7]: The PC did not feel that this rose to policy level concern. Recommended that a policy be included in the Action Plan regarding encouraging use of municipal water, proper abandonment and well safety, discouraging new wells and requiring registration of wells.

DEFINITIONS (noted by * in policy)

Renew:

A non-structural approach to improving water mains that includes cleaning, lining, sliplining and coating to improve water quality while extending the life of the pipe asset.

Sustainable:

A sustainable Lake Oswego is a community that meets the vital human needs of the present without compromising our ability to meet future needs. This includes consideration of both long term and short-term effects on ecological, economic, and community systems.

Watershed:
